n our upcoming lecture "All things Glass: Restoration and Conservation" Joan Di Stefano, MA — one of San Francisco-Bay Area's best known glass restorers and preservationists will take us through a colorful and inspiring story of her discovery and work with glass. She will describe the factors that come into play when approaching both the conservation of historic glass and the creation of new works that involve colored glass, lead and solder. In her presentation, Di Stefano will also break the pre-conceived idea that stained glass can only be repaired by an "expert" by sharing "do it yourself" techniques and methods on how to assess, repair and preserve stained glass windows.

In 2004 Joan received an AAPS Preservation Award for the conservation work of 38 stained glass windows of Alameda's First Presbyterian Church. In 2016, St. Joseph's Basilica on Chestnut Street also received an AAPS Preservation Award which included Joan's conservation work of the Basilica's stained glass windows. A graduate of the San Francisco Art Institute and New York University, with several impressive credits to her name, her work includes churches, homes and both commercial and public buildings. She attended glass conservation seminars at the University of York and Murray Edwards College, Cambridge University U.K.; and took courses for glass and marble mosaics in Ravenna, Italy.

One of the most amazing and renowned projects she has worked on is the restoration of over one hundred window panels she discovered at Gethsemani Abbey, in Kentucky. The story of how she happened upon these windows and then went on to reconstruct and save them, is one of synchronicity and magic, patience and love for the work.

"I came to glass by way of painting", she recalls. "I had one credit left to complete my BFA in painting from the San Francisco Art Institute, and 'working with glass', taught at the time by Narcissus Quagliata, was the only class I hadn't taken, so I signed up for it." After a month of cutting glass I realized that I really liked it. A lot of the problems I had with painting I felt I could work them out better with glass. During this period contemporary glass had a strong German influence and it was starting to take over in Washington and California, it was a big

thing, very exciting and new. So next thing you know, I'm making windows for friends, friends of friends, new clients, next it's a church with a broken pane... unknowingly I'd started my own studio, working on my own. At the same time, I just wanted to learn everything I could about working with glass, so I followed my passion and went to Pilchuck Glass School in Stanwood, Washington. I also wanted to do everything right, so I joined the Stained Glass Association of America and went to their conferences and workshops.

After pursuing formal training, I realized that my main interest was in the conservation and the restoration of stained glass. I revere the work of the past and I want to honor it,

preserve it and cherish it. And I love to work! I feel like I've been put in this world to work with glass and share what I know with other people. When I'm not in my studio, I work with organizations like Arts Connect in Santa Clara County, with teenagers at risk and the homeless. My hope is that through art and learning they have an opportunity to realize their dreams of a better life."

Don't miss this interesting and fun lecture presented by one of the foremost experts in stained glass in the country — Joan Di Stefano.

Alameda Artist Spotlight

Alameda is Justin Pastores' hometown. He's watched it grow through commercial business development, expanding real estate, and growing diversity. What stayed the same however, is its small town charm. Growing up, all he wanted was to get off the island. Now as an adult he says it's a place he never wants to leave behind.

One way Pastores keeps the island with him is to explore, document, and pay tribute to it through his art. He currently works with both transparent and opaque water media, often working from life. His subjects range from figures to landscapes to more illustrative work. Pastores also exercises his skills in plein air painting, capturing small town street scenes, industrial textures, and a mix of organic shapes with man-made structures.

Pastores was included in Bynd Artisan's Perfect Sketchbook group show, Interlace in Singapore. He placed 1st at the second Annual Benicia Plein Air Paint Out along with receiving the Artist Choice Award in summer 2017. In early 2017, he exhibited and lectured with his collective Epekto Art Projects at the Wailoa Arts & Cultural Center in Hilo, Hawai'i. He received a B.F.A. in Traditional Arts from California State University East Bay. His painting, "#Nofilter" was collected by the university. He has exhibited across the Bay Area including Oakland, Berkeley, Novato, and San Francisco. He works as an art instructor for Cal Color Academy in Fremont and is currently an artist in residence at Art Works Downtown in San Rafael.

For as long as Pastores has lived in Alameda, he says there are pockets he still hasn't explored. He loves that even though the town is small, it is packed with diverse architecture. In Alameda, Pastores really enjoys painting areas where multiple buildings are layered together, churches with astounding decor, and busy intersections. "There are so many things to paint from the variety of homes decorating the streets, proud historical buildings, and structures that are redeveloping. With every corner, intersection, alleyway, main street, cul de sac, wherever I decide to turn, there will be something there to pull my eye."



n Sunday September 23rd, with glorious weather and six outstanding historic homes, the Alameda Legacy Home Tour was a great success. The homes themselves were the stars, of course. The Julia Morgan designed home and exquisite gardens on Bay Street attracted appreciative visitors all day, as did City Landmark Bruton House on St. Charles. Classic high-basement cottages on Alameda and Santa Clara Avenues shared attention with a marvelous Colonial Revival home on Sherman Street and a unique and impressive mansion designed by architect Ernest Coxhead on Santa Clara Avenue. The Coxhead house, now home to the Girls, Inc. organization, was enhanced by some of their teenage girls acting as docents while wearing period costumes, all provided by the talented Denise Brady.

The Gold Coast was alight with visitors from Alameda and all around the Bay Area who enjoyed the extraordinary interiors and gardens of these impressive homes. A number of improvements were made in tour organization, guidebook design and marketing, under the direction of Tour Chair Conchita Perales. Kevis Brownson masterfully managed the website, social media and marketing, spreading the word far and wide; and Jerry Schneider held a tight ship during tour day sales with the new credit card processing and a check-in app. Over 800 tickets were sold! However, this event would not be possible without the participation of over a hundred docents and volunteers who spend their day making sure it's a seamless and extraordinary experience for all tour goers. THE ALAMEDA ARCHITECTURAL PRESERVATION SOCIETY

(AAPS) has been protecting the architectural legacy of Alameda's historic buildings for more than 40 years. Through AAPS action committees, educational seminars and home tours, citizens of Alameda have learned to embrace their diverse older neighborhoods. Over 4,000 buildings are on the City's Historic Building Study List. Alameda City Hall, one of the oldest in California, is a historical monument.

Alameda retains the rich charm of a bygone era, in both residential neighborhoods and commercial districts. Alamedans responded to AAPS's preservation mission back in the early 1970s, when Victorians were being demolished in order to construct large apartment buildings. AAPS, then called the Alameda Victorian Preservation Society (AVPS), helped pass a local initiative, Measure A, that preserved vintage homes by forbidding the construction of buildings with more than two housing units.
